

Care Act 2014 – Safeguarding Adults

The Care Act 2014 introduces major reforms to the legal framework for adult care and support in England – to the duties of local authorities, to the rights of those in need of care and support and their carers, and to the funding system for care and support.

Overview

This course covers all the duties of Local Authorities in respect to safeguarding adults, covering the six principles of safeguarding: empowerment, prevention, proportionality, protection, partnership and accountability.

Promoting an outcomes approach in safeguarding that works for people, resulting in the best experience possible is a key focus of this course. Participants will go away with the confidence to raise public awareness so that professionals, other staff and communities as a whole play their part in preventing, identifying and responding to abuse and neglect.
